DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH: "The color is Purple"

Did you know that October is "Domestic Violence Awareness Month"? Are you aware that helping to prevent domestic violence and supporting its victims is the signature project of the General Federation of Women's Clubs?

Domestic Violence Awareness Month evolved from the "Day of Unity" held in 1981 and in 1987 the first domestic violence awareness month was observed. That same year marks the initiation of the first national domestic violence toll-free hotline. Congress passed a law designating October as National Domestic Awareness Month and each year a summit is held in Washington in October promoting legislation to further assist victims of violence. Annually, members of GFWC are invited to participate in this summit. Our national organization lobbies specifically on behalf of women and children.

On the local level, the Delmar Progress Club donated 634 hours last year and \$1,700.00 in in-kind donations towards relief efforts towards violence victims. Several bags of hand-knitted baby clothes and blankets were donated to the Maternity House for unwed mothers, Equinox and Interfaith Family Services. Other clothing items were donated to Mercy House, Grassroot Givers, and St. Peter's Hospital. Club members also served on a team that prepares dinner four times a year for women in need at Mercy House. Others donated several large bags of toiletries to assist women and children that have suffered from domestic violence. On a larger scale, GFWC offers a "Success for Survivors Scholarship". Since its inception in 2012, \$10,000.00 has been awarded in scholarships to provide survivors with a means to achieve both financial and personal independence.

Domestic violence impacts women, men, and children of every age, background and belief. Nearly one in four women in the United States suffer severe physical violence by an intimate partner. During National Domestic Violence Month, the GFWC reaffirms its dedication to forging an America where no one suffers the hurt and hardship that domestic violence causes. Won't you join in helping to stop this abuse and in helping to assist its victims? Every little bit helps!!!

Keep in mind that a "smile bag" is the size of a coloring book 12 X 14. Quilts or afghans should be 45X45 or 54X54 square. They can be made out of a cotton fabric or a light fleece, with a light batting filling. The doll pattern can be picked up at a meeting from Marge O'Brien. They should be made with white, buff or light tan muslin or light weight cotton.

Each smile bag contains the following items: .85 to 1.4 shampoo (screw top only), small comb, new wash cloth, hotel size bar or soap, small square mirror, child size toothbrush (single pack), sample size toothpaste, 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 coloring book, 8 pack crayons, small stuffed animal (beanie baby size).
