

SEPTEMBER 19, 2022 BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES

Present: Pamela Tindall-O'Brien, Debbie Gall, Barbara Kavanagh, Margaret Dilgen, Christine Doran, Phyllis Drew, Lynne Lenhardt, Carolyn Bennett, Joan Gavrilik, Kathleen Newkirk (via Zoom), Barbara Hogan (via Zoom), Maryalice SvarE

Absent: Rosemary Brown

Pam Tindall-O'Brien called the meeting to order at 1:11, and welcomed everyone.

Review of minutes of July 18 meeting: members requested that minutes be emailed as soon as possible after the Board meeting. Pam will also re-send the minutes with the Agenda for the next Board meeting. Joan Gavrilik moved to accept the minutes, Lynne Lenhardt seconded, minutes approved.

Bylaws Committee: work on updating the Bylaws continues; a meeting will be held the last week of September. The ctte has identified many changes that they feel are necessary; these will be distributed at October 3 general meeting. Some discussion about whether the Board should approve changes prior to submission to the general membership; this is against the Bylaws. DPC membership will vote on the proposed changes on November 7.

DPC Strategic Plan: Pam is eager for input on the Strategic Plan. There was a discussion about formal adoption of the plan; Pam will present the revised plan at the November 14 Board Meeting. Lynne suggested re-titling it the Presidential Strategic Plan, Pam wants to keep it as it is.

Fall GFWC Meetings: Several members of the Board are planning to attend the Mid-Hudson District meeting of GFWC, which takes place on October 1 in New Paltz. Attendees will include Pamela Tindall-O'Brien, Kathleen Newkirk, Carolyn Bennett, Rosemary Brown, Anne Young, Lynne Lenhardt, and Marjory O'Brien. In addition, Pam, Lynne, and Kathy will attend the Mid-Atlantic GFWC Conference in Albany on October 7-9. The GFWC International President, Deb Strahanoski, will be in attendance. Members of our Club are helping with transportation for attendees. Pam will report on DPC's activities at the Mid-Hudson meeting.

Lynne reported on some members' participation in the Pancreatic Cancer Walk on September; the members raised \$520 for the Lustgarten Foundation. Lynne wants the Club to continue to support this event, and will get the word out sooner for 2023.

Library Relations: Debbie Gall continues to be our liaison with Bethlehem Public Library. She helped with the Fall Book Sale. DPC has also joined Bethlehem Neighbors and Friends of Bethlehem Parks and Recreation. Margaret Dilgen and Pam offered to coordinate DPC participation in "Trunk or Treat" on October 26, but Debbie asked for time to determine what she wants to do at this event. Discussion of what non-candy items might be given out. Additionally, Joan suggested that DPC might provide bookmarks for next Spring's BPL Book Sale.

Membership: Only ten members are unpaid. Debbie continues to make phone calls to all members. She has learned that some members pay dues, but prefer not to take part in Club activities. She has also updated some addresses.

There is a continuing need for technical help with the DPC website. Barbara Hogan will contact the BCHS Lab School or the High School Community Services liaison to see if an "intern" might be of help. She wondered whether our website might be too "jerry-rigged" at this point, and might need a total overhaul. It was suggested that the website include some pictures from the Pancreatic Cancer Walk.

Bethlehem Historical Assn: Barb Hogan asked the Assn about including some DPC materials to their holdings about Bethlehem in the 1950's. This may be possible in the future. Maryalice Svare asked about the Club submitting a "PSA" to OurTown about DPC events.

Fall Foliage Luncheon: Information on the Luncheon will appear again in the October PIP. Carolyn Bennett will also submit a blurb with information on the venue and menu details. Barbara Kavanagh will list her telephone number to facilitate car-pooling.

Travel: Kathy Newkirk is working on a daytrip to Longwood Gardens. She is awaiting more info from Yankee Trails. The Board was very enthusiastic about going ahead with this kind of trip. There was a discussion about possible "travel talks", with speakers including some Club members.

Margaret proposed that the Club have a speaker at the October 3 general meeting to give a short talk about the proposition on the November ballot for the Town of Bethlehem to purchase land to keep it from development. This would be informational only.

Yearbook creation and distribution: Printing of the Yearbook went well, and was under budget. The Corner Gateway provided the printing. Members had the option to receive the Yearbook via email, and Joan hopes to encourage more members to take advantage of this method. The Library held copies for those requesting paper Yearbooks with reserved books. This was fairly successful, but 61 books still needed mailing. Discussion about lengthening the hold time at the Library. Lynne wondered whether personal delivery might give us valuable one-on-one with members. Barb Kavanagh moved to cover the postage expenses incurred by Barb Hogan, Lynne seconded, motion passed.

Future Board meetings were set for November 14 at 10 a.m., January 9 at 10 a.m., and April 10 at 1p.m.

Holiday Tea: This event is set for December 13, and a chair is needed. Possible venues include Bethlehem Lutheran Church, Delmar Methodist Church, and Delmar Reformed Church. Margaret noted problems with having enough helpers to serve and pour tea. The Board discussed a menu of finger sandwiches and cookies. It was suggested that members bring poinsettias for table deco. Several suggestions were made for entertainment, including a cellist, a Senior Services vocal group, and the Friendship Singers.

Lynne moved to adjourn the meeting, Margaret seconded. Meeting was adjourned at 2:57.
