



November 14, 2022 Board of Directors Meeting Minutes

Present: Pamela Tindall-O'Brien, Debbie Gall, Barbara Kavanagh, Margaret Dilgen, Christine Doran, Lynne Lenhardt, Carolyn Bennett, Joan Gavrilik, Kathleen Newkirk, Barbara Hogan, Maryalice Svare

Absent: Phyllis Drew, Rosemary Brown

Pam Tindall-O'Brien called the meeting to order at 10:03, and welcomed everyone.

Pam commented that the set-up for the General meeting was very successful, that it seemed to stimulate interaction between members, and recommended using the same arrangement for future meetings.

Review of minutes of September 19 meeting: Joan Gavrilik moved to accept the minutes, Lynne Lenhardt seconded. Minutes were approved.

The bylaws revisions have been finalized. They will be published in PIP, and on the Club website. A hard copy of the revised bylaws can be obtained from Lynne.

The Board discussed membership deadlines, which will change next year, pursuant to a change in the Bylaws approved by the membership. Last year, the yearbook list was frozen on the October 1 deadline, and the December PIP listed members dropped for non-payment of dues. This year, the deadline is October 1, and the December PIP will contain a list of those who are no longer members, with no mention of unpaid dues. For 2023, the dues deadline is August 1 to get a yearbook, and September 1 is the hard deadline to retain membership. Discussion included the difficulties of chasing down the 12-15 members who consistently pay late. Barbara Hogan suggested that this could be a task for the Telephone Ctte.

Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer's Report was distributed and is attached. There was a discussion about the budgetting process, and whether study group leaders and others are aware of monies they have been allocated. Board members were informed that the Finance Ctte could meet to re-allocate funds to address unexpected needs. The new DPC brochure and business cards for the club were specifically mentioned as needing funding. It was also suggested that the Finance Ctte ask for input on money needs for the Club. It was discussed that some members absorb expenses rather than ask to be reimbursed. It was decided that this led to unrealistic reports, and could result in a cut to a budget line for that activity going forward.

Membership Report: Membership currently stands at 127 members. Debbie Gall has prepared special invitations for the seven new members who will be honored at the Holiday Tea. Chris Doran and Debbie will confer on the unpaid members for the December PIP. Barbara Hogan and Joan Gavrilik will be added to the list of people who receive membership updates electronically.

Communications: Barbara Hogan presented a preliminary mock-up of a new membership brochure. She welcomes input on content and style. The brochure currently available at the Library is unchanged for many years, and was felt to be rather uninteresting. A suggestion was made to include bullets from the Strategic Plan concerning Service, Education, and Community. The brochure could include facts about the Delmar Progress Club that the Bethlehem community is unaware of, such as leadership on the establishment of the Library, the Community Garden, and the beginnings of the system to use house numbers for Delmar. The membership contact information should be standardized, and should be in agreement with the Club website. Pam charged the Communications Ctte with finalizing the brochure, and getting an estimate for printing the brochure and business cards. The estimate could then be presented to the Finance Ctte.

Holiday Tea: Barbara Kavanagh and Carolynn Bennett shared the current state of preparations for the Tea, scheduled for Tuesday, December 13 at 2 p.m. More than forty members have volunteered to help. The Telephone Ctte will contact members to determine how many will be attending. Donations will be accepted on that day for the Food Pantry, and for local Veterans. The Club's silver serving ware has been picked up and inventoried, and after the Tea, the Club will arrange for a valuation to be completed.

Community Service: At the last General Meeting, ladies made ornaments that will be used to decorate a tree at the TenBroeck Mansion on November 29. The Club has been asked to help sort food donations resulting from the Boy Scout food drive. Other projects for the coming year include the Pajama Project and MoonCatchers. More details about these projects will appear in PIP.

Travel: Kathy Newkirk was not able to schedule a trip to Longwood Gardens in PA for the Fall, but she will continue to pursue the trip for Spring 2023. It was suggested that New York Botanical Garden or Brooklyn Botanical Garden would be an interesting day trip.

Albany ProMusica Outing: Barbara Hogan has 16 checks in hand, and will order the first batch of tickets today. There is still an option to send in payment for a second group of tickets.

Walks and Movies: Participation has been dwindling, and perhaps with the weather worsening, people are reluctant to commit to outdoor walks. Joan felt that it was a shame to let the walks stop after two years, and perhaps with more word of mouth, the walks and the Tuesday movie nights would gain participants.

November 14, 2022 Board of Directors Meeting Minutes (continued)

New Business: Carolynn Bennett distributed Project Report Forms, which should be completed by each activity chair. They are quite valuable in keeping track of member interest, and are also used by the President in completing reports for GFWC. Carolynn also provided copies of handouts on the origins of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and a handout on Jane Cunningham Croly.

The Board discussed the possibility that the current dues are inadequate to keep the Club financially stable, and what remedies might be possible.

Pam researched D&O insurance on the Club officers, which was prohibitively expensive. Some other non-profits in Bethlehem are able to piggyback on Town insurance, but this is not an option for the Club. Some members gave the opinion that because we do not do programs for the general public, D&O insurance is not necessary. Carolynn said that since our only income is from dues, her feeling is that the insurance is not needed.

EXTRAS: Barbara Hogan will send thank you notes on behalf of the Club to Corner Gateway and the Library for their help this year. She will notify Margaret Dilgen.

December 5 General meeting is a lecture on TenBroeck House.

Lynne Lenhardt moved to adjourn, Chris Doran seconded. Meeting adjourned at 11:50.

Service Committee Project for February Meeting

This is the only project this year that requires any financial commitment.

Bedtime rituals help children to get a good night's sleep which is important for growth and for learning. Challenges – including low family income, housing insecurity, and family instability – prevent many children from following a bedtime routine, feeling comfortable and secure at night, and getting the sleep they need. The Pajama Project is a National Organization which collects NEW Pajamas, books, and necessary bedtime materials to promote good bedtimes and good sleep for children. They are provided to local community organizations.

At the <u>February meeting</u>, to honor Valentine's day, and our motto of "A Caring Community", we will collect the following:

NEW Pajamas: Warm cozy pajamas (no nightgowns) from infant through adult (for teens). Tags should be left on all donations. The size 8 to 3XL are often overlooked when people donate. No see-thru or transparent material, inappropriate images, or wording.

NEW Books: story books for birth to young adult that do not focus on culturally inappropriate topics or focus on defined family roles. No coloring or activity books accepted.

NEW Hygiene Materials: Children's toothbrushes, toothpaste, soaps.

At the meeting, we will make washcloth teddy bears as a project to go with the other bedtime materials. Feel free to bring a friend. All materials will be provided.
